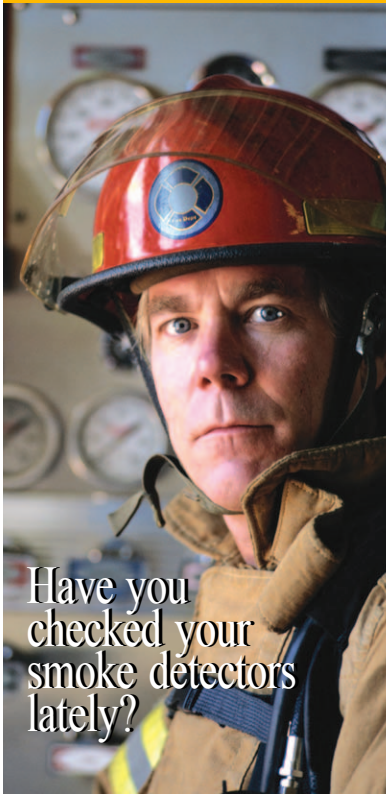


Smoke Detectors—Life Protectors

According to the National Fire Protection Association, 15 of every 16 homes, 94 percent, now have at least one smoke detector, but approximately one-third of homes that experience fires have a smoke alarm that isn't working. Most often the problem is caused by old or removed batteries.

Regularly check your smoke detectors to be sure they are working. Plan to periodically replace the batteries in your detectors. It doesn't matter what date you choose. For instance, put fresh batteries in all of your smoke detectors when the time changes in the spring and fall.

If you don't already have smoke detectors in your home, purchase some. In many jurisdictions, it's the law to have working smoke detectors in or near every bedroom. If you are not sure how many you need, your local fire department would be happy to assist you. Smoke detectors are easy to install and, more importantly, they are an inexpensive way to keep your family alive in case of a fire.



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
